

The Revision Questionnaire

There is a strong link between the kind of revision you do and the outcomes. Which of the two students will do better in an exam:

Student 1: does 15 hours revision – all of it reading through class notes

Student 2: only does 10 hours revision – 2 hours making mind-maps, 2 hours creating flash cards, 3 hours writing timed essays, 2 hours working through past papers and looking for patterns in the questions and ½ an hour doing the hardest question they could find.
